**For those folks who already have "Ride Pennsylvania Horse Trails-Part I, the Eastern Half of Pennsylvania" please note the following. **Bald Eagle State Forest:** Some sections of the trails as described in the book have changed or are in the process of being changed or rerouted. Check with the State Forest Office contact number listed in the book, in advance of your visit, for the most recent information and obtain the latest maps. Avoid sections now indicated as hiking-only on the map, such as areas along the Bake Oven & Cracker Bridge Trails.

**Bucks County Horse Park:** During the research for this book, Bucks County Horse Park, in the town of Revere, was privately owned but open to the public for membership. When it came time for its owner to retire, many concerned individuals and groups dedicated their time and efforts to ensure the park's conservation. Their hard work was rewarded as Bucks County Horse Park is now owned by Bucks County and has been preserved for future generations to enjoy. **Evansburg State Park:** Avoid sections of the trail in the Mill Race vicinity that are restricted to hiking.

**Pennypack Park:** Equestrian parking changes have been made. Please contact the Friends of Pennypack Park as listed in the Pennypack chapter for updates.

**The Horse-Shoe Trail:** Under "Maps and Info," the Jenkintown contact is no longer applicable.

**Wyoming State Forest:** Recently, we noted the trails have become rockier in several areas; shoes are recommended. In addition, the color of the designated horse trail markers has changed from orange to red. Blue blazes now mark the X-C ski trails which equestrians can also utilize.
